Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) assists Rotary Clubs in Australia with the development and management of international community service projects.

Whether it's projects to help rebuild in the aftermath of disaster, programs to bring education to countries where illiteracy stifles development or bringing health care and medical aid to those who can least access it.

RAWCS so often has a hand in helping the world stand on its feet. RAWCS supports Rotary Clubs in sending teams of volunteers to developing countries to provide assistance upon the development of much needed facilities, especially within the health and education areas.

Advice, assistance and training in building, construction and commercial operations (for example, assistance in obtaining microfinance) are also provided by RAWCS to support developing communities in establishing themselves

Life Education NSW is a community-based, independent organisation at the front line of positive and preventative drug and health education. In NSW over 300,000 students in over 1,400 schools take part in the preschool, primary and secondary programs each year. Helping young people make informed decisions about drugs and their health is at the heart of the program, which is driven by the popular Life Education mascot Harold the giraffe.

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) is part of an International Rotary project to educate senior high school students (years 10 - 12) on the United Nations organisation and its vital commitment to world peace along with health, education and living standards around the world. MUNA helps students to develop public speaking and debating skills along with the study of the customs, culture and problems of the world's nations. Delegates attend MUNA wearing the national dress of the country they represent.

Rotarians Against Malaria (RAM), the prevention of mortality, and a reduction in morbidity and social and economic loss caused by malaria through a progressive improvement and strengthening of local and national capabilities in malaria control. RAM is a project of RAWCS with the project covering: Australia, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Timor Leste.

Interplast. Rotarians were there in the beginning. They've been a constant throughout the decades and they're very much a part of Interplast's bright future, with repairing bodies and rebuilding lives.

Integrally involved in the establishment of Interplast in 1983 with the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, Interplast is supported by Rotarians in clubs and districts throughout Australia and New Zealand.

Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment; RYPEN.

The Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) is a program of weekend seminars for young people between the ages of 14 and 17 years.

Its principal aim is the communication of a series of ideas, problems and social experiences, which will assist the young participants in forming their own values and moral standards.

The weekend camp also features activities designed to facilitate trust building, working in groups, self-esteem building and content and process skills for young people.

The program caters for teenage boys and girls who have shown some qualities of decency, courage, persistence, sincerity and application in everyday life, which deserve further development.
