Ann Chapple, the guest speaker, Ann volunteered at a very short notice, to address our club members, THANK YOU.

Ann considers Mollymook to be her second home, as she moved to London in the 70s and yearly comes back, except for the COVID years, Ann has a nursing background and for the last 30 years has volunteered at the Chelsea Physic Gardens.

Since 1673 Chelsea Physic Garden has occupied four acres of land on the edge of the Thames. The garden was first established by the Apothecaries (chemists) in order to grow medicinal plants, and in September this year it will turn 350 years old.

Ann is in the pharmaceutical section of the garden, where she volunteers, trains, fundraises and propagates plants.

The Garden's unique microclimate and location has allowed to grow plants from around the world, collection of around 5,000 different edible, useful, even toxic-poisonous ones and medicinal plants that have changed the world.

Plants from all over the world are grown, plants from North America, Oceania, Mediterranean, Canary Islands ...

The Garden's primary benefactor was Sir Hans Sloane, a famous physician, naturalist, in 1712 Sir Hans purchased the Manor of Chelsea from Charles Cheyne. Hans went to Jamaica and saw people chew a bark (Jesuit Bark) which protected them from the fever associated with Malaria, he also found the therapeutic effects of Cocoa beans specially if you add milk to it, chocolate! Sir Joseph Banks received his botanical knowledge at the Gardens.

Medicinal plants grown are used in oncology, ophthalmology, cardiology, analgesia, anaesthesia ...
