Guest Speaker Rex Russell - Military service 21 years, has worked for a consultant with KDR, returned to Public Service were one of Rex's role looks at ways selling equipment to overseas country. Has been a UN Peacekeeper in Western Sahara - Minurso, were Rex assisted with the recovery of weapons in the area, operation enduring freedom 2003. Then worked in Iraq working with agencies to assist with mowing lawns building laundries, kitchen etc.

Rex now works on a project Redwig. Project Redwig is electronic equipment. The concept of operations with this type of this device can block signs in improvised explosive device, IED, working with the Afghans, where the need to get the devices on the ground to save lives. The devices are called white gum and it was a long road for the political acceptance of these devices are now being handed out to NOG's and foreign affairs agencies to use in the front line in Afghanistan.

After 18months of trying to get funding for the prototype the team managed to get funding for the White gum device - once the funding started to roll in for the device it then boosted up the requirements for the devices and supply of parts for the device. Then education and showing the Afghans how to use and make the device. Cultural in Afghanistan it is accepted practice for corruption as it is being a benefit the outcome of the project and gaining respect.

This device was developed in Australian before the USA could come up with the technology. Rex than spoke on the Military sales and assisting companies that are contracted to the Defence Dept with foreign countries in the exchange of technology.
